15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

Salesian College Sonada & Siliguri has three multidisciplinary Deaneries with seventeen departments. Education in the truly modern (as well as its classical sense) cannot but be interdisciplinary as well as multidisciplinary, to be truly holistic. We at salesian believe in holistic education and are committed to the promotion of interculturality as an essential ingredient of preserving the heritage and legacy of the Indian civilizational journey. In today's global context, it thus becomes essential for the upcoming generation to learn the values of whole person education, as it gets enshrined in the mode of teaching learning.

The Deanery of Commerce, Management and Vocational Studies has three major departments offering multidisciplinary courses to the students. The student associations on campus, guided by the faculty, like the Entrepreneurship Development Cell (EDC) and ENACTUS - the largest (EN)Entrepreneurial (ACT) action made by (us) students around the world, - bring the interdisciplinarity and multidisciplinary of learning in and through the hand on Start up projects they engage in.

The Deanery of Arts/Humanities has four schools and twelve departments offering multidisciplinary courses to the students. In the School of Psycho-Social Praxis the students of psychology, sociology and social work get to mingle and learn from three departments in the course of their studies. In the School of Literature, Media & Polity, English literature students, Mass Communications & Journalism and Political Science students are provided a platform for interdisciplinary learning experiences through cross disciplinary exchanges in the course of their honours study. Students of the School of Education & Social Studies have opportunities in cross pollinating across the departments of education, history and geography. Music as performing arts, physical education and National Cadet Corps as generic elective subjects are offered to interested students who, again, get the chance to

experiment with art, body and martial discipline based learning experiences provided by these departments.

In the Deanery of Sciences, the college offers honours programme in Mathematics, Computer Science/Applications, Physics and Economics. The students taking economics and computer science can take any generic elective course from arts/humanities prescribed by the university. Hence, this provides an environment for the students of these departments to undergo transdisciplinary experiences of learning and widen their scope of knowledge. Hence the very nature of the courses we provide under various departments calls for this multiversity of experiences to the students who take up the respective courses.

In all three deaneries and in both campuses, the social engagement is deeply considered and inbuilt into the curricula. Besides, the projects go beyond syllabus in order to instil the value of integral education. The service learning project - taking the classroom teaching to the community - and learning from that experience has enriched both the students and faculty. Similarly, too, the attempt to integrate the learning attained by the students by the time they reach the final year through a short dissertation, that helps integrate the various subjects they have learned through the graduation programme, also enables the interdisciplinary summation of the learning process they have undertaken.

17.Skill development:

Salesian System of Education originated with Don Bosco in the 19th century Italy focusing on the skill upgradation of young people to make them feel empowered. Hence in order to transform the youth into employable and productive workforce there is a dire need for skill development of the youth so that they add not only to their personal growth, but to the country's economic growth as well. Skill development primarily focuses on practical delivery of work and helps the learner enhance his technical expertise so that he is ready for day one of his job and companies don't have to invest into training him for his job profile. Skills are acquired through learning. Hence, skill training is imparted to the students to train and nurture their talent in the desired field. Skill development provides increased career growth opportunities in the life of a

learner.

Salesian College has provided skill training for the graduates as well as the neighbourhood youth over the years. Typing and Shorthand, Spoken English and Corrective Grammar of yester years turned into Computer Literacy and Hardware Training to App creation and AI in more recent decades and years. The College is registered with the Skill Hub Initiative of the Government as a Service Provider offering Beauty Therapist and Food and Beverage short term courses. It is being offered presently in Salesian College Sonada premises. The college offers BVoc courses in Retail Management and Tourism Services with the provision that the skill trainee can take break inbetween for work and return to complete. Besides there is in built into the course internship opportunities giving hands on training.

The Siliguri Campus from it inception was open to offering Short Term Skill Training in Hospitality in collaboration with Don Bosco Tech, which was initially funded by the Ministry of Rural Development, Government of India and later with the support of the various companies as part of their CSR. The Tea Garden student population from disadvantaged locations and the students who could not clear for their academic studies and had an aptitude and desire to enter into the work force were the first preferences This programme has over the years placed over 800 students into employment.

In a wider perspective, the college has a department of Sports and another in Music. These too are enabling the students who are on campus and are talented or have come to discover their artistic skills or kinesthetic intelligence an opportunity to develop their skills in Music and Sports and Games. The College Gym and the Playfields offer wide variety of physical training and opportunities for toning the body and preserving better mental and physical health. Individual students with potential have stood out over the years and have won accolades at the university and even state level recognition. The Salesian TV and Radio have also contributed towards showcasing the talents of students and drawing them into new avenues of skill development. The cyber security courses, eComphymathix, COP courses and Value Education also provide skill development.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

Salesian College runs UG and PG degree courses atuned to Indian

Knowledge System in imparting education the best way possible to the students of North Bengal and surrounding areas. The course structures have been designed keeping in view the vision of the Indian Knowledge System. The vision is to promote interdisciplinary research on all aspects of "Indian Knowledge Systems", preserve and disseminate "Indian Knowledge Systems" for further research and societal applications.

In the course curricula, the students are introduced to the individuals and organisations who have contributed by way of Research, Teaching, Publication and Preservation of ancient and contemporary rich Indian knowledge systems ranging from art, music, dance, drama, to mathematics, science, technology, life sciences, environment and natural sciences, health care, yoga, law, jurisprudence, economics, social sciences, psychology, philosophy, management, linguistics, and to some extent the oral/local traditions of knowledge.

With the new education policy-NEP 2020 focusing on Indian Knowledge Systems and Intelligence Traditions of India, the courses introduce the students to dense and varied culture, knowledge and traditions of India across millennia. The courses also assist the students to become well versed in their very own traditions, cultures and systems inherited from the past that are essential for their overall progress and development in life. The courses also help the students to think independently and critically within Indian frameworks and models for solving the problems of the present day for advancing a truly modern society.

AECC for honours program and LCC for program courses provided by the college helps students select their mother language as a subject. The courses operate in line with the college's motive of being not just an educational institute but a place where multi disciplined learning is encouraged. The Indian knowledge system helps students inculcate life goals and values that encourages them to lead a happy, self-motivated and contented life. The Indian knowledge system in Salesian College teaches students to be self-dependent in taking life decisions by educating them with Indian as well as modern values and thought processes.

In the department of Education there are special subjects in the first and the sixth semesters that teach the concepts of the Indian knowledge system from philosophical perspectives. The development of the education system of India from the ancient periods to post independence is taught throughout the six semesters of the department of Education. Education is imparted with the belief that

knowledge can never be stationary, rigid or strict from the perspective of both content and structure. The college follows education policy that augments continuous development of teaching tactics and constant gaining of new insights. In the entire process of imparting knowledge and education, the culture of being 'critically accepting' and 'self-respectful' of the received wisdom is inculcated.

During the pandemic, the same modules of educating young Indians of our nations have been followed, especially in the above-mentioned subjects and courses online. Several activities and writing skills tests have been conducted by faculty members where the values taught through the Indian knowledge system have been evaluated.

19.Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

Outcome Based Education was introduced to the faculty, in general, in the FORTE (Faculty Orientation in Research and Teaching Excellence) program in September 2019. It was held at Sonada Campus and a team of resource personnel from IISER (Indian Institute of Science and Engineering Research) Pune conducted the program. We also had (Rtd.) Professor Spencer Benson from University of Maryland and working at the University of Macau as another trainer. Since then Faculty Development Programs have been taking place from time to time to address this methodology and to train new faculty.

Salesian College has been using the Moodle Learning Management System (LMS) from 2012. However, in the early days, it was used only for conducting aptitude tests for new students willing to take admission. Around the same time training was conducted for faculty on VCT (Virtual Classroom Teaching) which was based on the same platform. In the second half of 2019, this LMS was again set up for serious use and training was conducted for faculty by the IT/Tech Team of the Institution.

When the pandemic hit the world, we were quite ready to transition to an online mode of teaching. Changeover was quick and smooth. However, there were many challenges to overcome. Learning curve was steep for many - faculty and students. Network issues and server outages became quite common. Sustaining education in such environments made the outcome based education all the more relevant. Faculty from various departments stood up to the challenge and lent their knowledge and expertise to help fellow members come up to speed. In particular, departments of Computer Science and Applications (core IT/Tech Team), Education, Mass Communications and Journalism and Psychology gave their time and talent. With the

constant support and encouragement of the Management, this journey has been an enriching experience for all.

National Education Policy 2020 and subsequent emphasis on Blended Learning by the UGC became the driving force for our Institution to collaborate with other Institutions for knowledge sharing and pioneering the roadmap for translating the concepts into practice in this part of the country. Faculty have experimented with different teaching methodologies. Revised Bloom's Taxonomy has been adopted as the fundamental pedagogy - some debates regarding its adoption in Science and Technology courses notwithstanding.

We have had a number of workshops led by faculty from the Department of Education to define Competencies, Objectives and Outcomes by all Departments. We have had the Tech Team pitch in to help fellow faculty to configure them in the Learning Management System and how to use them to assess achievements by students, primarily in the Cognitive domain. Proper configuration, proper use, regular monitoring can help not only the students but also the faculty to fine tune the teaching methodologies to make it effective and the students to achieve the intended outcomes.

We have made a good beginning. However, full adoption is far from over and this is an ongoing process. With experience faculty are getting mature in understanding the concepts and implementing them in practice.

20.Distance education/online education:

Distance education has become a modern trend and every student is willing to learn and upskill through continuous study and practice. Distance learning programs have helped many students who are unable to attend campus-based or full-time courses to realise their educational aspirations. Apart from students, working professionals also benefit from distance learning. It has given a platform to the learners to enrich their skills and nurture themselves with time and technology. Considering India's talent and the population, Distance Education has a very hopeful future, and the students' expectations are relatively high. The expansion of the Information Technology based learning tools have added to the incentivisation of distance education accross the world, and especially in India.

IGNOU - Indira Gandhi National Open University - is one of the largest government distance learning universities in India that is known for its quality education. The degrees granted by IGNOU are valid and recognized not only in India but also abroad. Pursuing a

degree course from IGNOU brings students at par with other regular graduates. Graduates from IGNOU are eligible to apply for jobs in both government and private sectors. Also, they are eligible to appear for various UPSC, SSC and banking exams without being discriminated.

At Salesian College Sonada the special study centre was initiated in 2005 and in Salesian College Siliguri Campus IGNOU study centre was started in 2011 as another special study centre. With gradual increase in the enrolled students these centres got recognized as regular study centres in 2018 and 2020. Both the Centres at Salesian College Sonada and Salesian College Siliguri are also recognized Examination Centres for IGNOU Term End Examinations.

The College Faculty and Office cum Support Staff have been very generous over the years to provide the additional services over and above their normal duties in order to keep alive the centres and reach out to the learners coming from near and far. The Management has always encouraged these as its extension activities, in keeping with the Vision and Mission of reaching education to the unreached and those in difficult circumstances.

Besides IGNOU the online education has been promoted by the institution even before the covid related new awareness of its benefits. This has happened through the awareness related to the MOOC (Massive Open Online Courses) and SWAYAM courses as options for students and faculty as an opportunity for additional learning. The College Library has popularised the eContent available through INFLIBNET both to the students and faculty. The College Website has dedicated pages for the Library and therein, the accesibility to the eResources of the Library in the Open Access Mode is made available.

1.1 - Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 - The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Curriculum delivery in a well-planned and documented manner is essential for an academic institution. Following are the practices carried out in SC.

IQAC chalks out the curriculum goals and strategies at the start of each semester, considering the past semester's feedback. These roadmaps are then passed to each department to execute according to their unique conditions. Each department faculty member prepares the lesson plans before the semester and documents their monthly progress in the Unitization Reports.

The students are made aware of the syllabi contents, course objectives and learning outcomes at the start of the semester. They are also informed about the modes of the curriculum delivery process. A variety of teaching methodologies are implemented depending on the necessity of particular courses.

For the holistic development of the students, the college organizes field trips, industry visits, workshops, student seminars, group discussions and other various activities. These opportunities are

also offered to the students of the courses that do not mandate such activities. The objectives of the curriculum are assessed by Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE). A mid-term and an end-term examination constitute the CIE, among other modalities mentioned by the affiliating university. Remedial classes are provided to the slow learning students.

The academic year ideally starts with the odd semesters from July and the even semesters follow from the month of Jan-Feb. However, in the covid-affected last session, the calendar was overturned more than once by the affiliating University. Nevertheless, the college maintained the balance between being flexible to the unforeseen needs of the time and its integrity to provide justice to the holistic education of its students.

As per the affiliating University's guidelines, the college continuously evaluates the students through term papers, reports, seminar presentations, class tests, and fieldwork. The college conducted all these exercises within the time frame stipulated by the University. Depending upon the needs of individual subjects, each department executed at least two of the activities. The CIE mechanism of the college also assessed the students' behavioural patterns on the metrics of regularity, punctuality, participation, leadership and communication skills, creativity and organising skills, social concern, peer engagement, application, and campus culture. Even after restricting the execution and evaluation of the activities online, the college successfully completed the entire CIE process along with the online mid-semester and end-semester internal examinations to satisfaction. Report cards containing the students' entire performance including the internal end-semester examinations were communicated to them individually.

1.3 - Curriculum Enrichment**1.3.1 - Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum**

The institution has been working for the holistic development of the students. The college has established POSHC (Prevention of Sexual Harassment Committee), Women Cell, Anti Ragging cell, NSS, NCC, Grievance redressal committee, and Human Rights cells to address the abovementioned points. These cells organise programmes related to gender equality, sustainability, human values and ethics at various scales. The environmental issues are dealt with in detail in the classroom through a regular subject entitled 'Environmental Studies'. The college delivers a self-designed curriculum of Value Education (VE) to every student as a mandatory subject. The effectiveness of the VE curriculum is guaranteed by the full-fledged bi-annual examinations and by providing grades for the same. Besides, the Honours course in Sociology includes a paper that addresses social issues such as gender-based violence, dowry, divorce, poverty, and illiteracy. Honours course in Political Science teaches its students about gender justice, equality, gender and politics, women empowerment and its impact on politics, among

other topics. The Department of English deals with issues related to gender studies. The Department of Bachelors of Social work has organised a series of workshops with the female tea workers of neighbouring tea garden areas of Darjeeling to help and empower them.

Every student has strengths and weaknesses which impact their learning process, pace of understanding and performance. Taking this into consideration our mentoring system, preventive in nature, functions at two different levels, i.e. the group and the individual, catering to the student's holistic development. The mentoring structure aims to build a sound, reliable and transparent student-mentor relationship by enhancing the contact hours, screening student's academic performances, updating college regularity, personality enhancement and nurturing their social sensibility. Through our continuous evaluation we identify the slow learners and the advanced learners and help the former by conducting remedial classes and counseling sessions. The latter through quizzes on MOODLE as well as offline assignments. Students are encouraged to participate in seminars, conferences, workshops and sensitization programmes to gain knowledge. For better understanding we incorporate chart making, besides films and audiovisuals, into lessons as innovations in instruction strategies and learning modalities for both groups. Group study is recommended among the students as it helps in areas which need more attention and clarifies their doubts in a healthy, studious environment. Therefore, the college has implemented more concrete, transparent and systematic approach to teaching-learning by identifying the mentors for each activity having its own assessment action plan.

The traditional methodology of teaching-learning has been revolutionised dawning the new era of learning. Information and Communications Technology (ICT) enabled teaching methodologies and advanced technology has been implemented in the classroom and in administration. MOODLE is one such Open Source Learning Management System wherein students can do assignments, attend quizzes and access other Multimedia teaching aids like Videotelephony services. It allows communication with the students and encourages communication between them in forums and discussions. LCD projectors and Smart Boards are in vogue. Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) enables efficient and centralised management of data by faculty. Google meets (Google classrooms, G suite accounts) podcasts and video production through college's official you tube channel, online video conferencing, webex and zoom are being used for conducting online webinars and classrooms. The academic and other plans are available in the beginning of the semester in the form of handbook and calendar. The institution's ICT enabled structures have constructively contributed towards securing and assuring its students a resourceful academic community. The academic session 2020-2021 continued under the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) at the undergraduate level as in the previous session. Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) under the Choice Based Credit System, consists of 15 marks out of which 10 marks are for internal assessment and 5 marks for attendance. The types of activities under which students are engaged as a part of CIA are: class tests, assignment submission, paper presentation plus power point, group discussions, class tests, field trips, projects, open book exam, quizzes, and other various forms of assessment techniques decided by the faculty. College conducts mid-semester examinations every year, for even semester in the month of March and May and for odd semester in the month of September and November. Due to Covid 19 Pandemic classes from mid March 2020 were conducted online and hence internal assessment was also conducted online through official platform via Learning Management System (LMS) MOODLE where grades of students are recorded for each paper. Students and their parents are regularly intimated about the students' performance, mark sheets are issued and any issues or grievances, if brought to notice are addressed promptly.

2.5.2 - Mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances is transparent, time- bound and efficient

The college has transparent, time bound and efficient mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances. Examiners submit the marks within a week after the examination. The marks obtained by the students in internal assessment test/assignments are uploaded periodically on the college/university web portal along with their attendance. The same is notified by the HoDs in the official WhatsApp groups of the departments. Internal examination test papers are given to the students for self-assessment. The college has a well organized mechanism for redressal of examination related grievances: The students can submit their grievances either orally or in writing to the faculty in-charge or HoDs who in turn will bring it to the notice of the College Examination Committee to redress the grievance as per the requirement and jurisdiction of the grievance. The unresolved grievance, if any, is referred to the Principal or Vice Principal by the HOD's depending upon the requirement. The Examination Committee headed by the Co-ordinator makes sure that the grievances are solved quickly and no grievance is kept pending for more than a week. An evaluation meeting is conducted by the College Examination Committee where they review and plan for better conduct of examinations in the future.

Owing to the Covid-19 pandemic, the college has been functioning in online mode (according to the University Regulations) starting from mid-March 2020. However, from November 16, 2021 to December 21, 2021 the college was permitted for offline classes. Academic session 2020-21 followed different methods to measure the level of attainment of Programme Outcomes (POs), Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs) and Course Outcomes (COs) through a continuous and comprehensive evaluation system (CIA) as per University norms. This is done internally at regular intervals through class tests, group discussions, written assignments, presentations, field trips, projects, open book exams, quizzes and internal end-semester tests in blended mode. The reports of these are recorded in the LMS for reference of the students as well as the authorities. Indirect measure of the attainment of objectives and outcomes is done through

surveys and collection of regular feedback from students, parents, teachers and other stakeholders. The College organized several Faculty Development Programmes to facilitate faculty with emphasis on blended mode of teaching and learning focusing on Programme Outcomes and Course Outcomes. The main objective of FDP like Outcome Based Teaching Learning and Evaluation (OBTLE) was to evaluate Programme and Course Outcomes deepening the critical reflection on the same.

4.1.2 - The Institution has adequate facilities for cultural activities, sports, games (indoor, outdoor), gymnasium, yoga centre etc.

Salesian College highly believes in the importance of physical well-being along with academic excellence. The institution has adequate facilities for cultural activities, sports and games. For this purpose, outdoor multipurpose sports grounds are available (142X125mts) for football, handball and cricket. The corner of the ground is equipped with cricket net and two volleyball courts (19X9 mts), five badminton courts (13.4X6.1 mts) and four basketball courts (28X15 mts). The college has indoor sports facilities, a table tennis room (13X7 mts) and a well-equipped gymnasium (14X9 mts). There is an open multi-purpose hall (Killian Hall, 50X24 mts) for cultural activities, two Audio-Visual Halls (12X8.56mts) and Marengo Hall which is (14.6X8.53 mts). Everyday students are encouraged to play games at least for an hour after classes or when there are free periods. The students are encouraged to participate in inter-departmental, inter-college and other tournaments of District, State and National levels. The student body also organizes a number of activities like the annual sports track and field events, Technokrat, Savoir Faire & Inscape. Every year Cultural Day, Sports Week, Marathons, Yoga and meditation sessions besides workshops for self-defence are also conducted. The founding body, governing members, Principal/ Rector and Secretary, Vice-Principals, Bursar, Deans, Campus Coordinators and the heads of the departments constitute the administration and has a management style that have been decentralized through participatory decision making mechanism.

Governance is the key activity that acts as a bridge between the management and stakeholders. The institution has a strong Governing Body made up of eminent members to define and interpret policies and decisions related to both academic and other aspects of administration. 6.2 - Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 - The institutional Strategic/ perspective plan is effectively deployed

College has a systematic strategic/ perspective plan which is revised every five years. Salesian College having completed third cycle of academic audit, considers it a responsibility to bring the Institutions of higher Education in North Bengal and Sikkim region to a common platform for information dissemination and experience sharing. As per the recommendations of NAAC Peer Team from the previous visit, the college planned to expand the infrastructure in Siliguri campus to accommodate more students. In order to provide better library facilities for increased number of students the college library, with more space (6600 sq.ft), books and physical infrastructure, is shifted from Taverna Block to Don Bosco Block.

In order to offer greater educational service in the region new courses have been streamlined - BTH, MSW and GE Music - and applied for affiliation to the State Education Council/ department and the University. Similarly follow up action on the request for institutional Academic Autonomy with the UGC and University is in the process.

Realising the importance and involvement of IT companies in the field of education, the college (IQAC & SRC) organized a webinar on UGC's concept note: "Blended Mode of Teaching and Learning" on 6th and 7th August, 2021.

The Faculty members submit their self-appraisal report at the end of every month along with their Unitization Report. The performance of each faculty member is assessed according to the Annual Self-Assessment for the Performance Based Appraisal System. Promotions are based on the appraisal performance format for UGC Career Advancement Scheme (CAS) that is based on the Annual Performance Indicator (API) score. The institution also conducts the annual performance appraisal of its faculty members through two mechanisms. Firstly, the students are provided with a google form link to submit their feedback on their teacher's performance. The student feedbacks are evaluated by the head of the institution annually. The feedbacks are communicated to the faculty members individually by the Principal. Secondly, an annual self-appraisal is submitted by the faculty members at the end of the year. The performance of the non-teaching staff is reviewed by the Bursar of the college in regular meetings. Besides, the general matters arising out of the PAS are addressed during faculty/ staff meetings held towards the end of every Semester.

Salesian College has a healthy and transparent audit mechanism under the aegis of the Bursar, finance head of the college. The internal auditor conducts audits of expenditure related to various co-curricular, workshops, seminars, field trips and students' activities, as and when they take place. The internal auditor is an Ex-Officio member of the finance committee, purchase committee and construction committee. Tri monthly meetings are held for these committees. A budget is submitted before an event takes place to the Vice-Principal who passes it to the Deans after observations. The Deans after verification gives it to the internal auditor who scrutinizes the application and hands it over to the Bursar. Library purchases are directly approved by the Principal, Vice Principal or the Bursar. The finance office maintains purchase bills which are submitted to the internal auditor in a predesigned format after the events. The same after verification is submitted to the Bursar's office. The external audit is conducted twice a year, with the auditor coming from Kolkata. The audit committee is open to all new ideas and suggestions for improving its functioning for the betterment of the college from the Student Council, faculty, and support staff, seeking to economize any expenditure.

(1) IQAC has introduced the practice of ensuring timely, efficient and progressive performance of academic, co-curricular and administrative tasks. Reports of any academic, curricular or co-curricular activities need to be uploaded in the home-made system within two days after the events. Even the teaching-learning activities of the faculty are recorded in the system on a daily basis. The Principal/Vice-Principal can monitor the entire activities in the college online through IQAC calendar -IQAC monthly reports and Unitization Reports of the faculty are significant features of this system. (2) IQAC has introduced the practice of ensuring optimization and integration of modern methods of teaching-learning and research. This has been achieved through various means: the Blended Mode of teaching-learning introduced since Covid days; Use of MOODLE (LMS) as the official Platform for online teaching-learning; Faculty Development /Training Programme, Research Scholars' Workshops and UG Research held in order to provide orientations on modern methods of teaching-learning; Updating of technological equipments and infrastructure required for the same. Two examples of institutional reviews and implementation of teaching learning reforms facilitated by the IQAC during the period are: (1) The College has implemented Blended Mode of teaching-learning as a new strategy embedded within the National Education Policy. Faculty Development and Training Programme have been planned out under three phases with collaboration of Salesian Tech Team. Under the guidance of the IQAC, the adaption of New Normal that is the transition from the Traditional Way of Teaching and Learning has been effectively adapted through Online System of Education with various e-

resources/learning such as MOODLE, Google Meet, WEBEX, etc. (2) IQAC has taken up the initiative to introduce Outcome Based Teaching Learning Evaluation (OBTLE). The faculty members were given orientation on 25th and 26th March 2021 on the same. The new system has been based on the Rubrics of Outcome Based Education. Every faculty has prepared the course objectives and outcomes of every subject which have been displayed in MOODLE platform for students. A Self-Appraisal format has been introduced in the ERP where a faculty gets an opportunity to review and assess such outcome based teaching-learning. Deans and Vice Principals of the respective departments monitor the progress of Outcome based Teaching-Learning.

Curriculum delivery in a well-planned and documented manner is essential for an academic institution. Following are the practices carried out in SC.

IQAC chalks out the curriculum goals and strategies at the start of each semester, considering the past semester's feedback. These roadmaps are then passed to each department to execute according to their unique conditions. Each department faculty member prepares the lesson plans before the semester and documents their monthly progress in the Unitization Reports.

The students are made aware of the syllabi contents, course objectives and learning outcomes at the start of the semester. They are also informed about the modes of the curriculum delivery process. A variety of teaching methodologies are implemented depending on the necessity of particular courses.

For the holistic development of the students, the college organizes field trips, industry visits, workshops, student seminars, group discussions and other various activities. These opportunities are also offered to the students of the courses that do not mandate such activities. The objectives of the curriculum are assessed by Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE). A mid-term and an end-term examination constitute the CIE, among other modalities mentioned by the affiliating university. Remedial classes are provided to the slow learning students.

1.3 - Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 - Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum

The institution has been working for the holistic development of the students. The college has established POSHC (Prevention of Sexual Harassment Committee), Women Cell, Anti Ragging cell, NSS, NCC, Grievance redressal committee, and Human Rights cells to address the abovementioned points. These cells organise programmes related to gender equality, sustainability, human values and ethics at various scales. The environmental issues are dealt with in detail in the classroom through a regular subject entitled 'Environmental Studies'. The college delivers a self-designed curriculum of Value Education (VE) to every student as a mandatory subject. The effectiveness of the VE curriculum is guaranteed by the full-fledged bi-annual examinations and by providing grades for the same. Besides, the Honours course in Sociology includes a paper that addresses social issues such as gender-based violence, dowry, divorce, poverty, and illiteracy. Honours course in Political Science teaches its students about gender justice, equality, gender and politics, women empowerment and its impact on politics, among other topics. The academic session 2020-2021 continued under the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) at the undergraduate level as in the previous session. Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) under the Choice Based Credit System, consists of 15 marks out of which 10 marks are for internal assessment and 5 marks for attendance. The types of activities under which students are engaged as a part of CIA are: class tests, assignment submission, paper presentation plus power point, group discussions, class tests, field trips, projects, open book exam, quizzes, and other various forms of assessment techniques decided by the faculty. College conducts mid-semester examinations every year, for even semester in the month of March and May and for odd semester in the month of September and November. Due to Covid 19 Pandemic classes from mid March 2020 were conducted online and hence internal assessment was also conducted online through official platform via Learning Management System (LMS) MOODLE where grades of students are recorded for each paper. Students and their parents are regularly intimated about the students' performance, mark sheets are issued and any issues or grievances, if brought to notice are addressed promptly.

The college has transparent, time bound and efficient mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances. Examiners submit the marks within a week after the examination. The marks obtained by the students in internal assessment test/assignments are uploaded periodically on the college/university web portal along with their attendance. The same is notified by the HoDs in the official WhatsApp groups of the departments. Internal examination test papers are given to the students for self-assessment. The college has a well organized mechanism for redressal of examination related grievances: The students can submit their grievances either orally or in writing to the faculty in-charge or HoDs who in turn will bring it to the notice of the College Examination Committee to redress the grievance as per the requirement and jurisdiction of the grievance. The unresolved grievance, if any, is referred to the Principal or Vice Principal by the HOD's depending upon the requirement. The Examination Committee headed by the Co-ordinator makes sure that the grievances are solved quickly and no grievance is kept pending for more than a week. An evaluation meeting is conducted by the College Examination Committee where they review and plan for better conduct of examinations in the future.

Owing to the Covid-19 pandemic, the college has been functioning in online mode (according to the University Regulations) starting from mid-March 2020. However, from November 16, 2021 to December 21, 2021 the college was permitted for offline classes. Academic session 2020-21 followed different methods to measure the level of attainment of Programme Outcomes (POs), Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs) and Course Outcomes (COs) through a continuous and comprehensive evaluation system (CIA) as per University norms. This is done internally at regular intervals through class tests, group discussions, written assignments, presentations, field trips, projects, open book exams, quizzes and internal end-semester tests in blended mode. The reports of these are recorded in the LMS for reference of the students as well as the authorities. Indirect measure of the attainment of objectives and outcomes is done through surveys and collection of regular

Salesian College highly believes in the importance of physical well-being along with academic excellence. The institution has adequate facilities for cultural activities, sports and games. For this purpose, outdoor multipurpose sports grounds are available (142X125mts) for football, handball and cricket. The corner of the ground is equipped with cricket net and two volleyball courts (19X9 mts), five badminton courts (13.4X6.1 mts) and four basketball courts (28X15 mts). The college has indoor sports facilities, a table tennis room (13X7 mts) and a well-equipped gymnasium (14X9 mts). There is an open multi-purpose hall (Killian Hall, 50X24 mts) for cultural activities, two Audio-Visual Halls (12X8.56mts) and Marengo Hall which is (14.6X8.53 mts). Everyday students are encouraged to play games at least for an hour after classes or when there are free periods. The students are encouraged to participate in inter-departmental, inter-college and other tournaments of District, State and National levels. The student body also organizes a number of activities like the annual sports track and field events, Technokrat, Savoir Faire & Inscape. The founding body, governing members, Principal/ Rector and Secretary, Vice-Principals, Bursar, Deans, Campus Coordinators and the heads of the departments constitute the administration and has a management style that have been decentralized through participatory decision making mechanism.

Governance is the key activity that acts as a bridge between the management and stakeholders. The institution has a strong Governing Body made up of eminent members to define and interpret policies and decisions related to both academic and other aspects of administration. To ensure efficiency and effectiveness on approval of the Governing Body, a number of academic and administrative bodies have been formed with duties and responsibilities.

6.2.1 - The institutional Strategic/ perspective plan is effectively deployed

College has a systematic strategic/ perspective plan which is revised every five years. Salesian College having completed third cycle of academic audit, considers it a responsibility to bring the Institutions of higher Education in North Bengal and Sikkim region to a common platform for information dissemination and experience sharing. As per the recommendations of NAAC Peer Team from the previous visit, the college planned to expand the infrastructure in Siliguri campus to accommodate more students. In order to provide better library facilities for increased number of students the college library, with more space (6600 sq.ft), books and physical infrastructure, is shifted from Taverna Block to Don Bosco Block.

In order to offer greater educational service in the region new courses have been streamlined - BTH, MSW and GE Music - and applied for affiliation to the State Education Council/ department and the University. Similarly follow up action on the request for institutional Academic Autonomy with the UGC and University is in the process.

Realising the importance and involvement of IT companies in the field of education, the college (IQAC & SRC) organized a webinar on UGC's concept note: "Blended Mode of Teaching and Learning" on 6th and 7th August, 2021.

The institution has a very systematic Performance Appraisal System (PAS) for both its teaching and non-teaching staff. The institution has both monthly and annual Performance Appraisal System. The Faculty members submit their self-appraisal report at

the end of every month along with their Unitization Report. The performance of each faculty member is assessed according to the Annual Self-Assessment for the Performance Based Appraisal System. Promotions are based on the appraisal performance format for UGC Career Advancement Scheme (CAS) that is based on the Annual Performance Indicator (API) score. The institution also conducts the annual performance appraisal of its faculty members through two mechanisms. Salesian College has a healthy and transparent audit mechanism under the aegis of the Bursar, finance head of the college. The entire faculty, students and support staff are working in collaboration ensuring the optimization and integration of modern methods of teaching and learning. IQAC monitors and reviews the same during the monthly meetings with the entire faculty.

Two examples of institutional reviews and implementation of teaching learning reforms facilitated by the IQAC during the period are: (1) The College has implemented Blended Mode of teaching-learning as a new strategy embedded within the National Education Policy. Faculty Development and Training Programme have been planned out under three phases with collaboration of Salesian Tech Team. Under the guidance of the IQAC, the adaption of New Normal that is the transition from the Traditional Way of Teaching and Learning has been effectively adapted through Online System of Education with various e-resources/learning such as MOODLE, Google Meet, WEBEX, etc. (2) IQAC has taken up the initiative to introduce Outcome Based Teaching Learning Evaluation (OBTLE). The faculty members were given orientation on 25th and 26th March 2021 on the same. The new system has been based on the Rubrics of Outcome Based Education. Every faculty has prepared the course objectives and outcomes of every subject which have been displayed in MOODLE platform for students. A Self-Appraisal format has been introduced in the ERP where a faculty gets an opportunity to review and assess such outcome based teaching-learning. Deans and Vice Principals of the respective departments monitor the progress of Outcome based Teaching-Learning.
